Dear Mr. Scott:

I am writing to urge the proposed renewal of Terri Bauer's contract to lead our juvenile sex offender program. As you know, I see Ms. Bauer daily at the juvenile detention center when I am doing detention hearings. I've known her for ten years and I routinely preside over review hearings when her participants either complete the in-patient portion of treatment or are discharged from probation after successfully completing all of the conditions imposed by the Court. Infrequently, I also preside over hearings in which a participant has violated the conditions of Ms. Bauer's program; those hearings are far less common and are grim because the alternatives for those children are few in number – maybe one or two – and those programs have limited success.

It's difficult to imagine the outcome for Collin County children who are charged with sexual offenses if Ms. Bauer's program is not available. First, the number of children who are served is far greater than the 24 kids who currently reside in the in-patient program. There are many more children who are served by Ms. Bauer in an out-patient program, who are in her aftercare program and who are receiving regular counseling from her while on deferred adjudication probation. Her total caseload at any one time actually runs between 70-80 children, and their families.


Second, the range of sexual offenses served is wide and crosses all racial and economic lines. Ms. Bauer counsels children for offenses that range, on one hand, from "sexting" offenses to, on the other, distribution of child pornography on the Internet, and literally everything in between. Many of these children are victims of sexual abuse or other serious childhood trauma. Others are pulled into these offenses because of exposure to pornography. There's no "typical" child served by Ms. Bauer. They come from all racial and ethnic backgrounds; some children are in poor families and others, many more than we realize, come from affluence. Many of these children are very intelligent and have exceptional talents and abilities.

Third, all of these children need and deserve the intervention provided by Ms. Bauer. National research that has been conducted over the last 40+ years demonstrates that a high-quality program like Ms. Bauer's can actually cure these children. The statistics show that successful participants have the lowest recidivism rate of any type of offender. That translates into safer communities, but that level of success does so much more. It means that our state and our community doesn't continue to spend tens of thousands of dollars on repeated incarceration as these children become adults. It also means that these children become adults who utilize their talents, have jobs and careers that add dollars to our community.

Finally, Ms. Bauer's program is specifically named and discussed in Marc Levin's paper for the Texas Public Policy Foundation, "Getting More for Less in Juvenile Justice: Innovative and Cost-Effective Approaches to Reduce Crime, Restore Victims, and Preserve Families," March, 2010 (p. 31), as an effective juvenile program, both in terms of results and cost. Mr. Levin notes that the program costs less than half the cost of TYC, has an extremely low recidivism rate, and provides treatment with extensive family involvement that would otherwise be difficult if the children were incarcerated out of county or at TYC facilities.

I think, on a personal level, each county commissioner should some day come and watch a child arrested for aggravated sexual assault, a first degree felony, at an initial detention hearing, listen to the testimony of the allegations, look at the child who is sitting in the small courtroom in the juvenile detention center and read the psychological evaluation that is conducted two weeks later, and obtain a real understanding of who that child is at that time. Then the commissioner should come to the review hearing a year or so later when he has completed the inpatient portion of Ms. Bauer's program. Finally, the commissioner should return at the discharge hearing when the child has successfully completed probation. There are no words to describe that transformation. If one multiplies that by the hundreds of children Ms. Bauer has treated, then I think each commissioner would truly understand why this program is so valuable on a human scale and worth every cent on an economic scale.



In-Patient/Out-Patient Juvenile Sex Offender Treatment Program

Mission Statement: The mission of the Juvenile Sex Offender Program is to provide comprehensive assessment and treatment for juveniles who sexually act out as well as their families. The ultimate goal of the program is to prevent the recidivism of the juvenile by changing his and the family's maladaptive functioning.

Eligibility: The following criteria is to be met:

- Age 10-17
- Adjudicated on a sexual offense and/or ordered by the court to attend sex offender based therapy
- Willingness of juvenile to work in-patient/out-patient treatment program
- Willingness of parent to work supervision/parenting program

Assessment: An integral part of the juvenile's rehabilitation is the use of a comprehensive juvenile sex offender assessment. At times, additional psychological testing may be warranted to evaluate the juvenile's capacity to participate in treatment. The assessment evaluates the nature, extent of severity of the sexual aggression as well as the juvenile's level of cognitive functioning. This assessment is used to determine whether the juvenile is eligible for TYC, in-patient or out-patient services. In some cases, the youth simply needs psycho-educational intervention or not intervention at all. If the juvenile is determined inappropriate for in-patient/out-patient services, the Juvenile Probation Officer (JPO) will be advised.

The assessment includes, but is not limited to the following forms of information and testing: Parent and juvenile interview, this includes the following: ADHD screening, Conduct Disorder screening, Dangerousness checklist, Sexual History interview, Physical/Emotional abuse history, Social History, Drug History and legal history; Victim/Witness statement(s); J-SOAP, Psychological Evaluations and school records as available.

Program: The program is victim and empathy based in nature. It incorporates the use of cognitive-behavioral intervention with the juvenile and his family as well as experiential and traditional psychodynamic techniques. The methods used with the youth are based on the youth's ability to respond to treatment. This program is relapse prevention based with an emphasis on victim empathy. It concentrates on the importance of the juvenile to be functioning well in all areas of life either while participating in in-patient or out-patient treatment. The environments in which the juveniles are expected to perform well are -academic, social, familial and in structured activities. The youth will be assessed in each realm of functioning monthly and the information will be shared with his parents, JPO and other officers of the court as warranted. Youth who are

in residential treatment at the John R Roach Juvenile Detention Center will be advised of their progress in a monthly staffing.

Youth who are placed on probation for a sexual offense are placed on probation for 2 years. If the youth warrants in-patient treatment, that treatment will be "up to 1 year" with the average youth working their way out of in-patient treatment in 8 months. The youth then spends about another year participating in weekly out-patient treatment.

Essential Mechanisms: The program regards the ability of three essential mechanisms (Juvenile Probation Department Staff, Treatment Providers, and the person(s) who will be responsible for the supervision of the juvenile or the person responsible for his supervision upon release) working together with the utmost importance. If the juvenile or parent are not able to comply with the program requirements, a further long term intervention may be warranted.

Supervision: The role of the Juvenile Probation Staff (JPS) is both essential and an integral part of the juvenile's rehabilitation. The Juvenile Probation Staff work with the juvenile, his family and his treatment providers.

- A. Work with the juvenile
 - 1. Supervise all aspects of behavior
 - 2. Apply appropriate consequences for behavior based on detention/probation protocol
 - 3. Inform treatment providers/parents of behaviors that are of concern.
- B. Work with the family
 - 1. Coordinate meetings with probation officers, juvenile and family
 - 2. Active involvement in staffings of progress and release, based on who is most appropriate to attend meetings
- C. Work with treatment providers
 - 1. Keep open communication about progress of juvenile in detention/out-patient setting
 - A. Provide answers to detention/probation protocol questions
 - B. Provide authoritative support with JSO group members
 - C. Work closely with treatment provider in the assessment of continued treatment/supervision needs for the juvenile and the ability of parent to supervise juvenile upon release
 - 2. Enhanced ability to communicate and interact with the juvenile and family. Gain an understanding of the dynamics of juvenile sex offenses as well as behaviors that warrant concern.
 - 3. Work with treatment providers if warranted, to determine swift and appropriate consequences for maladaptive juvenile behaviors. These behaviors are including but not limited to; violations of detention/probation rules.

Parental Involvement: It is of utmost importance that parent(s) are involved in the rehabilitation

of their child. This helps to ensure that inappropriate behaviors by the juvenile are monitored sufficiently. Parents are required to participate in treatment to gain the tools necessary to adequately monitor and care for the juvenile.

Parent Psycho-educational Group:

- A. Dynamics of appropriate and inappropriate sexual behavior
 - 1. Sex education
 - 2. Laws regarding sexual behavior
 - 3. Family dynamics associated with sexual abuse
 - 4. Interpersonal dynamics associated with sexual abuse
 - 5. Confrontation of parental denial

- B. Supervision
 - 1. Knowledge of juvenile's probation requirements
 - 2. Working knowledge of juvenile's safety plan
 - 3. Working knowledge of juvenile's high risk behaviors
 - 4. Demonstration of appropriate boundaries
 - 5. Recognition of parental role in the offending behaviors of their child
 - 6. Implementation of appropriate coping skills modeled at home

Parents will be released from the program when they have exhibited mastery of the subject matter. This will be assessed by the treatment provider.

Treatment: Juveniles who are involved in the juvenile sex offender programs will be evaluated based on their progress in the 5 components of treatment. They will be required to demonstrate both cognitive and behavioral changes in all 5 components to a level that will better ensure the safety of the community. The level of competence in demonstrating the needed skills will effect the level of supervision/structure that is needed for the juvenile. Failure to comply with any of the behavioral components of the program as well as failure to demonstrate the cognitive changes required, will result in the request for a higher level of supervision.

Polygraph Testing: There will be polygraphs administered to each juvenile who is accepted into treatment. The juvenile will be required to take an instant offense/sex history polygraph approximately 90 days after beginning treatment. This will be used to determine whether the juvenile has taken full responsibility for his offense and to confirm that he is not minimizing the details of the offense. The sexual history polygraph is to be given to the juvenile to determine if he has committed any offenses other than the one for which he has been charged. At times, the sexual history is obtained during the instant offense polygraph interview. The decision about the specific polygraph to be run will be left to the discretion of the polygrapher. A monitoring polygraph will be administered to those youth who are in out-patient treatment to determine if they are practicing their required safety plans while in the community. This will be administered on an individual, as needed basis, at the discretion of the treatment provider in collaboration with the juvenile probation department.

It is generally accepted practice to polygraph the juveniles at about 3 months of treatment to

ensure that they are being honest about their offenses as well as any additional offenses or deviant sexual behavior. If the youth does not pass the polygraph, more work on honesty is warranted so that he may be re-tested on a later date. Failure to pass polygraph will be considered failure to comply with treatment. Following the initial polygraph, there is a monitoring polygraph given at approximately 6 month intervals to ensure that the youth are following safety plan and probation rules.

The Treatment Provider as well as JPO will also provide data to the examiner regarding the following: intellectual capacity, ability to understand terminology, potential delimiting factors such as medication use, age, severe psycho-pathology/organicity and physical constraints. Therapist must prepare a client several weeks prior to polygraph to obtain the necessary level honesty needed to pass test. This practice enhances the likelihood of pre-polygraph admissions.

Reunification: Much of the time, the youth who abuse do so in their own homes. In the past, the standard practice of some agencies has been to remove either victim or perpetrator with no reunification plan. This program considers reunification to be an integral part of the healing of the child and family. The youth, parent and victim work together to be able to provide a household that is both physically and emotionally safe. The treatment provider for the youth work in tandem with therapists from Collin County Child Advocacy Center as well as other agencies to assure that reunification is a positive process for the victim. Overwhelmingly, the victim finds much healing in the process. In most instances, this is the most healing portion of the process for the victim.

Format of In-Patient/Out patient Treatment: In-Patient Treatment will consist of three groups a week. Each youth will also have 2 individual sessions per month beginning in their second month of treatment. The groups will be an hour to an hour and a half. The in-patient groups are open-ended and accept new juveniles as they are admitted to the program. The group is formatted with two process groups per week and one focus/psycho-educational group per week. Out-patient groups are held weekly, as are parent groups. Out patient groups will cover identical topics on a less intensive basis. The groups are as follows:

Process Group: This group is primarily offense/life history/coping specific. Group members are expected to actively confront, support and give feedback to each other while processing primary treatment issues. The offense history, offense cycle, offense motivations, past victimization, victim empathy and relapse prevention are some of the primary areas for the group to focus its interaction on. Participation in process group directly relates to the 5 components of treatment. Juveniles will be evaluated monthly and their progress will be shared in monthly staffings. The staffing team consists of the JPO, Detention Staff, Detention Staff Supervisors, District Attorneys for the Juvenile Court and Treatment Provider. There will be exercises and homework via workbook (as well as journal writing) that the juvenile will be expected to have completed.

Focus Group/Psycho-educational: these are groups sessions focused on particular and critical aspects of sexual offending. These focus groups will include overviews and education concerning relapse prevention, victim empathy, healthy social skills, healthy sexual relationships and supervision.

Individual and family therapy: Family therapy is on an as needed basis, which will be determined by the therapist of the juvenile group or the therapist of the parenting group in conjunction with the JPO/JPS.

Three phases of treatment: There are three phases of in-patient as well as out-patient treatment. Juveniles need to meet the certain criteria to move on to the next phase. These phases are determined through interaction in the process groups and in individual treatment.

Beginning Phase: The phase where the juvenile is testing the limits of group, of what he can and cannot do. This phase is where the juvenile gets honest and takes responsibility for what he's done. He begins work on and completes his offense cycle. He begins to understand the thinking and behaviors that led to the offense(s). Behavior in this phase is exogenously based.

Intermediate Phase: The phase where the juveniles are doing well at confronting other group members. The youth begin to discuss more openly the issues of past victimization, familial discord, deviant thoughts and behaviors and a motivation to change. The juvenile is starting to get honest and shows empathy and concern for others. Development of safety plan and sharing offense cycle and safety plan with parent occurs in this phase. Additionally, the youth's thinking as well as behavior begin to change. The behavior becomes more endogenously based.

Advanced Phase: The phase where the juvenile has ownership of group and the group process. These youth take treatment seriously and are able to facilitate less progressed youth in the 5 components of treatment. They are respectful of the therapists but feel more as if the group belongs to them. They take responsibility for helping others. During this phase the juveniles are working on internalization. Their behavior reflects their new-found skills. They work in tandem with JPO, treatment providers and parents to ensure that their environments are conducive to their non-offending thoughts and behaviors.

Completion: After the juvenile has completed all group/probation requirements and has been able to function within the group in the advanced phase, he is then able to complete treatment at that level of supervision.

Qualifying for out-patient treatment (In-Patient Youth Only): the following criteria is evaluated in a qualitative manner based on the progress of the juvenile while in detention and the involvement of the community based supervisors to which he is to be released.

1. Appropriate supervisory figure must be living in the home
3. Parent must have developed skills needed to supervise youth
4. Ability of juvenile to function according to detention center behavioral criteria
5. Mastery of the 5 components of treatment

Outcome measures: Youth who participate in the juvenile sex offender program will be

assessed on the aspects of the 5 components of treatment on a monthly basis. There will be a staffing meeting held monthly to determine overall functioning of the youth. Staffing members include but are not limited to the treatment provider, JPO, Detention Staff, Detention Supervisory Staff and District Attorney's office. The juveniles will be rated on a scale of 1 through 5 with each score based on the following criteria:

1= Juvenile shows no competence in this area

2= demonstrates some understanding of the concepts, behavior does not reflect insight

3= demonstrated moderate understanding of concepts, behavior does not consistently reflect insight and understanding of concepts

4= demonstrates a high level of understanding and is able to practice the concepts in most daily living situation.

5= demonstrates a high level of understanding of the concepts and is able to verbalize and practice the concepts in daily activities for a prolonged amount of time.

The guidelines for evaluating the 5 components are:

I. Relapse prevention:

Development of offense cycle

Development/behavioral practice of physical safety plan

Development/behavioral practice of emotional safety plan

Identification of cognitive distortions and changing them to appropriate thought processes

Ability to control behavior/impulses

Ability to comply with community as well as probation requirements

Identification of offense cycle/red flags followed by an ability to use appropriate coping skills

II. Victim Empathy

Demonstration of an understanding of the impact of sexual abuse on the victim(s)

Ability to take full responsibility for their behaviors and understand their impact on others

Ability of identify environmental as well as cognitive role in sexual abuse

Affective demonstration of empathy

III. Development of Healthy Social Skills

Develop and maintain appropriate peer relationships

Develop and maintain an ability to interact with authority figures

Academic/behavioral achievement at the school level

Participation in adult supervised, peer-related activities

IV. Development of Healthy Sexual Relationships

Understanding of laws regarding sexual activity

Development of knowledge/behavior of appropriate sexual boundaries

Understanding of dynamics of healthy sexual relationship and ability to verbalize that knowledge

Ability to discuss and change deviant sexual fantasies
Ability to conceptualize appropriate fantasies

V. Supervision

Development of internal controls. He controls his own behaviors.
Parental demonstration of ability to identify relapse prevention concepts including but not limited to offense cycle, safety plan, red flags and probation rules
Parental ability to supervise juvenile in the community
Ability of parent to work in tandem with JPO, case manger, youth and treatment provider

Recidivism Data

The Collin County Juvenile Sex Offender Program has been in use in its current form for 11 years. We have found that by using this multi-systems approach to treatment, we are able to better treat and supervise these youthful offenders in the community. The numbers speak for themselves. Of approximately 420 youth who have been involved in treatment in the last 11 years, 2 have re-offended that we know about. In 2009, Dr. James Calvert conducted a study of the youth of the program. It was found that the recidivism rate is about .01% for those who successfully complete the program. There are those who were remanded to TYC or did not successfully complete who have re-offended. Those offenses are not included in the data.
