
- ❖ Serve first (meeting legitimate needs of others)




POPULATION SERVED

- ❖ 11,000 felony and misdemeanor adult offenders served in Collin County (17 and older)
- ❖ 5,000 of those supervised work/reside in Collin County
- ❖ Offenses range from theft to murder


Gender




ETHNICITY





SUPERVISION

- ❖ Court determines conditions of supervision
 - ❖ Restitution
 - ❖ Community service hours
 - ❖ Financial obligations
 - ❖ Random urinalysis
 - ❖ Etc.
- ❖ Assessment completed to determine risk to community and needs of the offender
 - ❖ Higher risk equals more contacts
 - ❖ Higher needs equals more contacts and referrals

COMMUNITY JUSTICE PLAN

- ❖ The Community Justice Council is established by Texas Government Code, Chapter 76.003.
- ❖ The Council shall provide continuing policy guidance and direction for the development of Community Justice Plans, community corrections facilities, programs, and conditions of community supervision.
- ❖ Texas Government Code, Section 509.007 details the role of the Community Justice Plan.

CJP DIVERSION PROGRAMS

MENTALLY IMPAIRED

- ❖ Population served (individuals diagnosed with bipolar, major depression, schizophrenia, and a GAF of 50 or below)
- ❖ 2 caseloads restricted to 40 defendants (20% misd)
- ❖ Monitoring of medication
- ❖ Counselor and officer collaboration
- ❖ Increased office and field contacts
- ❖ Collateral contacts with family and friends
- ❖ Officer trained in Motivational Interviewing (solicits offender buy in)

SEX OFFENDER

- ❖ Population served -- all registered sex offenders and offenses with a sexual component
- ❖ 2 caseloads restricted to 45 defendants
- ❖ Counselor and officer collaboration
- ❖ Increased office and field contacts
- ❖ Collateral contacts with family and friends
- ❖ Officer trained in Motivational Interviewing (solicits offender buy in)

SUBSTANCE ABUSE

- ❖ Population served – substance abuse evaluation indicating a substance abuse dependence disorder
- ❖ 3 caseloads restricted to 60 defendants (20% misd)
- ❖ Counselor and officer collaboration
- ❖ Increased office and field contacts
- ❖ Collateral contacts with family and friends
- ❖ Officer trained in Motivational Interviewing (solicits offender buy in)

HIGH/MEDIUM RISK

- ❖ Populations served – felons assessed as a high or medium risk
- ❖ 9 caseloads – 950 defendants
- ❖ Counselor and officer collaboration (as needed)
- ❖ Increased office and field contacts (as needed)
- ❖ Officer trained in Motivational interviewing (solicits offender buy in)
- ❖ Random call in system for urinalysis testing

ADDITIONAL CJP PROGRAMS & SERVICES

- ❖ Sheriff's Convicted Offender Re-Entry Effort (SCORE)
- ❖ Drug Court
- ❖ Veteran's Court
- ❖ Pre-Trial Diversion
- ❖ Treatment Alternatives to Incarceration Program (TAIP)
- ❖ Community Service Restitution
- ❖ Electronic Monitoring/GPS
- ❖ Random Urinalysis

SHERIFF'S CONVICTED OFFENDER RE-ENTRY EFFORT (SCORE)

- ❖ Intermediate Sanction Facility
- ❖ Population served – felony offenders who would otherwise be sentenced to TDCJ
- ❖ Houses 36 felony defendants for 6 to 24 months
- ❖ Adult Basic Education
- ❖ Substance Abuse Counseling
- ❖ Cognitive Behavior
- ❖ Community Service
- ❖ Lifeskills/Parenting Class

SPECIALTY COURTS

❖ Drug Court

- ❖ Population Served – Felony and Misd – judicial selection
- ❖ One felony and two misdemeanor caseload – up to 45 defendants
- ❖ Substance abuse evaluation and counseling
- ❖ Random call in system for urinalysis testing
- ❖ Increased contact with court, treatment providers

❖ Veteran's Court

- ❖ Evaluation & Counseling through VA

PRE-TRIAL DIVERSION PROGRAM

- ❖ Offenders must meet the District Attorney's criteria
- ❖ First Time Offenders
- ❖ Cases excluded DWI, Family Violence Assault, Delivery of a Controlled Substance, Possession with Intent to Deliver
- ❖ Currently 255 misdemeanor cases and 2 felony cases in this program

TREATMENT ALTERNATIVE INCARCERATION PROGRAM (TAIP)

- ❖ Population served – Felony and 10% Misdemeanor with a documented substance abuse history
- ❖ State allocated annual budget of \$40,000 to be used for substance abuse evaluation, supportive outpatient, intensive outpatient, and inpatient treatment

COMMUNITY SERVICE RESTITUTION

- ❖ Population served – Felony and Misdemeanor defendants
- ❖ Over 80 approved non profit agencies
- ❖ Over 20,000 hours served each month
- ❖ Indigent defendants allowed to perform community service in lieu of court ordered monies

ELECTRONIC MONITORING

- ❖ Population served – Felony and misdemeanor defendants
- ❖ GPS
- ❖ Ignition Interlock Device with camera technology
- ❖ Secure Continuous Remote Alcohol Monitoring Device (SCRAM)
- ❖ In-home alcohol monitor
- ❖ Remote.com – Monitoring of sex offenders computers

URINALYSIS TESTING SERVICES

- ❖ Population served – felony and misdemeanor defendants
- ❖ Approximately 1015 defendants tested monthly (19.5% positive)
- ❖ Random call in system used on all felons on specialized caseloads and drug courts
