Philip Sanders, Manager, City of Anna, was present in Court representing Anna's Mayor and City Council. They have reviewed the TIRZ policies and wanted it noted they have a number of concerns. According to Mr. Sanders, if these policies are adopted, it would put the City of Anna on "significant unequal footing" with cities with which they compete for economic development. (Time: 11:45 a.m.)

Daniel Valko, Princeton, Texas, was present to speak against the Lake Lavon bridge crossing project. Mr. Valko stated the project is supposed to be for economic development and to relieve congestion, but a bridge creates more development, traffic and pollution. (Time: 11:47 a.m.)

Commissioners Court was recessed at 11:47 a.m. and reconvened at 1:00 p.m.

Public Comments continued with Kay Nordby, Princeton, Texas, who also was present to speak in opposition to the Lake Lavon bridge crossing. She would like to see the whole project cancelled. Ms. Nordby stated people would prefer that the money be spent improving Highways 78, 1378 and 544. By improving the roads around the lake, Ms. Nordby felt there would be no need to build a bridge. She urged Court to look at other options. Judge Self asked Mr. Delgado to come forward to address some of Ms. Nordby's concerns. Mr. Delgado stated a lot of Ms. Nordby's questions would be answered during Ms. Homfeld's presentation. (Time: 1:25 p.m.)

GENERAL DISCUSSION

5. AI-30678 Public Hearing: FY 2010 Tax Rate / FY 2010 Budget, Budget.

Monika Arris, Budget, came forward with a Power Point presentation entitled "Collin County FY2010 Proposed Budget 1st Public Hearing". This is the first of three public hearings for the FY2010 proposed budget. As was stated in Budget Workshop, the appraised values are at \$72.4 billion, which is a .7% increase over the previous year. The tax rate was published by the Auditor on August 27th with the effective tax rate being .24941 and the rollback rate, which is split by debt and M&O, being .259072.

Ms. Arris continued, the property tax rate has not increased for the 17th year in a row and there is a 5% homestead exemption for the second year. The average home in Collin County is valued at \$233,591 according to the Central Appraisal District. With the same tax rate, the average homeowner will pay \$538 in county taxes next year, for a drop of \$3.31 less than they paid the previous year.

The next item discussed was total authorized positions, which is 1,793. There are two WIC positions which are state funded and one Elections position. Additionally, during workshop three positions were eliminated for a net increase of one position. There are two positions being held in contingency for the District Attorney.

Ms. Arris stated the General Fund had an increase of 1.4%, up to \$152.7 million, which represented a slight increase from last year. The Operating Budget increased by 1% from last year, up to \$175.1 million. The total combined budget increased by .2%, to \$270.0 million. The County had revenues of \$270.4 million and an adopted total combined budget of \$270.0 million. The slight increase is due to the Juvenile Board accepting more revenue from the State. Ms. Arris answered questions from the Court. The second public hearing will be the September 21st Workshop in Melissa. The Budget, tax rate and fee schedule will be adopted in Commissioners Court on September 28th.

Commissioner Ward wanted Ms. Arris to bring back state law having to do with probate, guardianship and fee structure. Ms. Arris answered questions from Commissioner Ward.

Judge Self opened the public comment portion of the hearing and asked if there were any comments on the Proposed Budget and proposed tax rate for FY2010. Hearing none, Judge Self closed the public hearing.

Commissioner Jaynes stated he had made a motion to cut supplemental pay for two County Court at Law judges during the Budget Workshop session. He did not realize at the time that the supplemental pay was State funded, not County funded, and he then made a motion to reinstate that supplemental pay for Judge

Lewis and Judge Barry. Cynthia Jacobson, Human Resources, came forward to clarify how the funds are received for the supplemental pay. Commissioner Shaheen had questions. Commissioner Jaynes made a motion to approve. (Time: 1:18 p.m.)

Mr. Ozmer outlined today's agenda and presentation, going through the Lavon Lake Route Study. The Project Location Map was explained and the presentation continued. Mr. Ozmer answered questions from Judge Self. Mr. Ozmer talked about the public involvement process and ways to get involved. Mr. Ozmer asked for comments or questions. Mr. Delgado stated this is the first meeting asking for public involvement. There will be more opportunities for the public to get involved. Mr. Ozmer answered questions from the Court. (Time: 1:39 p.m.)

Commissioner Hoagland had questions as to whether they would work with the jail community. Mr. Bilyeu replied yes, and then addressed that topic further. Commissioner Ward stated due to the economy a lot of organizations are reducing work staff and closing their doors, resulting in fewer services to citizens. Commissioner Ward gave statistics on the jail population with mental health disorders, adding we have to subtract what we're spending away from what we get from the State. Today's discussion is about the TIRZ policy, which is actually a TIF (Tax Increment Financing) policy, and Mr. Bilyeu reported feedback from various cities on that policy as well. The County will not participate in a TIF or TIRZ at a greater percentage than what a city does. Mr. Bilyeu outlined the policy and spoke about definitions and county participation. Mr. Bilyeu addressed some of Mr. Sanders' concerns for the City of Anna. Judge Self had questions of Ms. Arris. This matter will be back before the Court on September 21st and September 28th. Mr. Bilyeu was asked to change some wording in the policy at the request of the Court. Discussion followed among Court members and Mr. Bilyeu as to limits. Judge Self wanted to see a balance between what is a government function and what is increasing the tax base. (Time: 2:17 p.m.)

Commissioner Shaheen had an update for the Court. Marv Wilson, who is Commissioner Shaheen's appointee to the Efficiency Committee, came forward with a presentation. Eight projects have been started and Mr. Wilson gave the start dates and volunteers' names for each project. Commissioner Shaheen provided additional information and recommended the Court look at three IT opportunities. Discussion followed.

Judge Self asked Jon Kleinheksel, Public Works, to come forward. He wanted to know when Public Works will reach the 50 miles targeted in the asphalt program. Mr. Kleinheksel stated they have approximately 48 miles completed right now. Inclement weather has slowed progress. Judge Self recommended Public Works start again by October 1st. Commissioner Jaynes did not want the County to limit themselves to 50 miles, as they are on track to complete asphaltting 60 to 70 miles. He then asked the Court to hold this item until the September 28th Court. Judge Self stated next year will be a tougher budget year than this year; therefore, if Public Works stops at 50 miles, they will have a reserve to start for next year. Mr. Kleinheksel's response was yes and no. If his department stopped at 50 miles today, yes, they would have material in reserve. Discussion followed among Court members.

Judge Self said 50 miles is the policy. Commissioner Jaynes said "to say you have to stop at 50 is government control at its worse. We have 300 days in reserve. The sky is not falling." Commissioner Shaheen is worried about the future. Commissioner Hoagland does not want to stop the project. Commissioner Ward stated she thought the topic was the efficiency committee. Judge Self replied the Court is setting the date to start the Public Works Efficiency Committee. Commissioner Jaynes made a motion to bring this item back on the September 28th Court to allow him time to meet with Mr. Wilson and Mr. Mills, both members of the committee. Commissioner Hoagland seconded that motion. Judge Self told Commissioner Jaynes the Court delayed this last year at his request for one year for his election. Commissioner Shaheen wanted to know why Commissioner Jaynes wanted to delay it again. Commissioner Jaynes stated this was not brought up during Budget last year; rather, it was discussed off the record. Judge Self stated he did not understand Commissioner Jaynes' request.

Commissioner Jaynes offered explanation and again asked the Court to hold this item until September 28th. Commissioner Shaheen again asked for a reason to delay, to which Commissioner Jaynes repeated his desire to meet with Mr. Wilson and Mr. Mills. Commissioner Ward had questions. Commissioner Jaynes said he is not delaying just to delay. Commissioner Hoagland suggested having a staff person work with the committee as a liaison, preferably someone from IT or Budget, which is how other committees are staffed.

Caren Skipworth, IT, came forward and said she will work with Ms. Arris and they will help with the process. Commissioner Jaynes said he did not recall a discussion with the Judge to hold this item last year due to the election and he again made a motion to delay it for two weeks. Commissioner Hoagland seconded. Commissioner Jaynes added, other projects can be started; just hold off on Public Works. Judge Self asked Commissioner Jaynes for explanation. Commissioner Jaynes repeated his motion. Commissioner Ward then asked

Commissioner Jaynes for clarification on his motion. Judge Self told Commissioner Jaynes he had his delay of one year as requested and he now has his request for another two week delay. Commissioner Jaynes said this was not a revolving discussion over a year. Commissioner Jaynes again made a motion to approve but delay Public Works until September 28th. Commissioner Hoagland said he supports this committee, but wants it made clear this is not Commissioner Shaheen's committee; it's the Court's committee. The whole Court has to be behind it. Commissioner Hoagland then asked to modify Commissioner Jaynes' motion to include adding a staff person to the committee. Commissioner Jaynes agreed to that modification.

Judge Self stated he finds it hard to believe in a time when people want more efficiency, accountability and more transparency that anybody would want to delay Citizen's Efficiency. Commissioner Jaynes' response was he finds it incredible that someone would appoint a person to this committee that sued the County, resulting in \$200,000 in legal fees, and then appoint that person to oversee the efficiency of the department that was the focal point of the lawsuit. Judge Self stated the entire lawsuit was about efficiency and transparency. Commissioner Jaynes said it was about spending public money on private property. (Time: 2:42 p.m.)

Commissioner Hoagland put this item on the agenda. He stated he has seen Attorney Julie Fort, Strasburger & Price, at various meetings representing other political subdivisions. The County has been paying Rider Scott, also an attorney with Strasburger & Price. In the past the Commissioners Court has never done business with a law firm that had two lawyers representing both Collin County and a political subdivision that had an adversarial position to what Collin County's idea or policy was. Commissioner Hoagland wanted law firms to do a thorough check to make sure they do not represent anyone who has a conflict with Collin County. Discussion followed between Commissioners Hoagland and Jaynes. Judge Self wondered if this will limit the County to "one-man shops". Commissioner Jaynes stated the rules of professional conduct should apply and discussion continued among Court members. Judge Self felt it should be handled on a case by case basis. Commissioner Jaynes suggested having Mr. Bilyeu meet with Mr. Scott to see if there is a conflict. Judge Self stated Mr. Scott works

with a lot of the people that represent Collin County in the legislature. Commissioner Jaynes suggested looking at another firm. Commissioner Hoagland made a motion to not do business with law firms who have lawyers representing competing interests against Collin County. Commissioner Jaynes felt the motion was too broad. The motion died for lack of a second. (Time: 3:01 p.m.)

Commissioner Jaynes made a motion to retain another law firm if there is a conflict of interest. Commissioner Hoagland asked Mr. Bilyeu to have an attorney come before the Court and explain the Professional Code of Ethics. Commissioner Jaynes withdrew his motion. (Time: 3:05 p.m.)

14. AI-30760 Adoption of a resolution granting approval of a project of the Princeton Economic Development Corporation and further authorize the County Judge to finalize and execute associated documents, City of Princeton.

Mr. Bilyeu explained the process an EDC has to follow to spend money outside their city limits. They must have an acknowledgement from the Commissioners Court. Lee Lawrence, City of Princeton Administrator, was present to answer any questions. Judge Self read the following: "Be it resolved by the Commissioners Court of Collin County, Texas: The Commissioners Court of Collin County, Texas, hereby consents to the Corporation's Project and requests the Corporation exercise its powers within Collin County in relation to the Project, as described in the Act, and such consent and request shall be solely for the purposes of the Act. Collin County shall have no obligation or liability with respect to the Project, including the payment of any obligations used to finance the Project, nor shall any of the County's funds or assets be pledged to the payment of any such obligations."

Commissioner Jaynes had questions for Mr. Lawrence. Mr. Lawrence said by way of explanation this action for the purchase of land is not for the city but for the EDC. Under statute the corporation is required to get permission from this body because it is within the Court's jurisdiction. Public meetings have been held. (Time: 3:10 p.m.)

15. AI-30673 Compensatory Time, Human Resources.

Cynthia Jacobson, Human Resources, came forward to discuss compensatory time and to provide the Court with additional information regarding unfunded liabilities as requested during Budget Workshop. She showed the Court a Power Point presentation, starting with general information and a description of compensatory time. Compensatory time is government's ability to have people work more than 40 hours per week and not have to pay them an overtime rate. The concept is if there is a period of time where there is a heavy workload, employees can work overtime; and then when they have a lighter workload, they can take that accrued time off. As a result, there is no dollar cost associated with the overtime. Compensatory time for different departments is explained. Employees will be paid for compensatory time if they leave or if they exceed the legal limit. Compensatory safety time, which was eliminated three years ago, is another category and that is explained to the Court. Currently there are eight employees with between 400-500 hours of accrued compensatory time. Commissioner Shaheen had concerns that the County has managers who aren't managing their people. Ms. Jacobson said compensatory time is not a bad thing. If used correctly, it is a positive for the County. \$821,000 has been paid in overtime in the last twelve months mostly due to the Sheriff's office. HR is working with the Sheriff's office to reduce that number. Ms. Jacobson continued with her explanation.

Compensatory time recommendations: the policy is exempt employees get 80 hours, but that has not been enforced. Human Resources would like to start enforcing the policy for exempt employees. Commissioner Shaheen had questions about that. Ms. Jacobson would also like to change policy for non-exempts. If time is accumulated, at the end of the year it is paid because it is required by law. What HR would like to do is create a new bucket of compensatory time of 80 hours. Employees will be able to track their time. When an employee exceeds more than 80 hours for more than one month, a report can be generated to the Court and that employee can explain why they haven't been able to use it or they can get a payment for it.

Commissioner Shaheen asked for the mechanics of how it will work. Commissioner Hoagland wanted a breakdown of why the employee earned compensatory time. Department heads and elected officials have to designate dollars out of their budget for this. Ms. Jacobson concluded her Power Point.

Compensatory time recommendations by HR are as follows: first, for exempt employees, the policy as stated in the employee handbook will be enforced. Commissioner Shaheen made a motion to start enforcing the policy as recommended. Employees will have until January 2nd, 2010, to reduce compensatory hours to 80. Commissioner Jaynes had concerns that some employees may lose time so he suggested extending the date past January 2nd,

2010, so departments won't be shorthanded. Discussion followed among Court members. Commissioner Shaheen amended his motion to enforce the policy as of March 1st, 2010. (Time: 3:43 p.m.)




