GENERAL DISCUSSION

5. Al-31379 System Finance, NTTA.

Judge Self prefaced the item saying Collin County is one of four counties that form the NTTA (North Texas Toll Authority) and Paul Wageman, Chairman of the Board, was an appointee of Collin County. Judge Self said he requested the presence of the NTTA for an update to the Court.

Paul Wageman, Chairman of the Board, NTTA, addressed the Court with a presentation regarding the system finance of the State Highway 161 and said that the NTTA would make a decision this week on whether to accept the project. Mr. Wageman began by saying the NTTA Board was a regional collaboration which consisted of Collin, Dallas, Denton and Tarrant Counties as well as an appointee from Governor Rick Perry who was from Parker County. The presentation included a background of the State Highway 161 Project which is a continuation of the George Bush Turnpike as the Outer loop in Dallas County. Phase 2 & 3 are under construction by TxDOT and Phase 4 is anticipated to begin March 1, 2010.

Mr. Wageman informed the Court that the NTTA received one of only two Tiger Grants given in the State. This grant will be used to pay the credit charge on a TIFIA (Transportation Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act) loan which is a federal loan program administered through the Federal Highway Administration. The first five years of the loan there is no interest, afterwards there is a below market interest rate. They anticipate being able get a loan for up to \$400 million from TIFIA for State Highway 161. Mr. Wageman presented the Court with a calendar of meetings. If accepted State Highway 161 will be Phase 4 with an anticipated completion in late 2012. Commissioner Jaynes asked about the thought process behind marrying the two projects. Mr. Wageman responded saying the project has been on the regional plan for over 40 years. This is an important road in Tarrant County. The Board did not want to see all the resources spent on State Highway 161 without also getting Southwest Parkway/Chisholm Trail built. People are tired of waiting 30 and 40 years for roads to be built. TxDOT has been deprived of funding by legislators; therefore, they cannot build the roads.

Judge Self commented saying the roads being built do not appear to be able to offer a payback in the near future. Judge Self continued by asking if the NTTA is being put at risk because people want roads built that cannot be funded and do not make sense financially. Mr. Wageman responded saying other than the initial \$400 million there is

not a risk to the system. Extensive discussion continued throughout the presentation. Commissioner Hoagland questioned if funds would be coming back to the region.

Mr. Wageman said \$258 million of the \$458 million would be going back to the RTC (Regional Transportation Commission) because they advanced those funds to TxDOT for Phases 2 & 3 of State Highway 161. Commissioner Jaynes asked if the NTTA would exhaust the four scenarios before the backstop funds were used. Mr. Wageman stated they would consider placing tolls on State Highway 161 and Southwest Parkway before they would dip into the guarantee funds. Additional discussion followed. Commissioner Jaynes stated he thought accepting this project would set a bad precedent.

The last slide of the presentation referenced the DNT (Dallas North Tollway) Project, Phases 4B and 5. Judge Self said he thinks this to be a major issue for Collin County and has mailed letters to every Mayor and President of the EDCs (Economic Development Corporation) asking them to participate in the Public Hearing in Collin County.

Commissioner Shaheen asked if there was any need for a representative from Johnson County. Mr. Wageman said yes there would be in the future. Commissioner Shaheen also said he would like to see the report for 2009. Mr. Wageman said the report will be out March 1, 2010. Additional discussion on future revenues and debts followed. Commissioner Jaynes asked when the Board would be looking at increasing tolls. Mr. Wageman said the Board has a policy which resets the tolls every two years. The rate is 14.5 cents per mile as set by the RTC and is increased by 1.5 percent. Judge Self thanked Mr. Wageman for his update and stated that he welcomed other Counties that would start paying tolls because the majority of the toll roads are located in Collin County. (Time: 10:46 a.m.)

Judge Self recessed the meeting at 10:46 a.m. and reconvened at 10:51 a.m.

6. <u>Al-31506</u> County Economic Development Policy and Collin County Regional Airport, City of McKinney.

Frank Ragan, City Manager, City of McKinney, read a letter from McKinney Mayor Brian Loughmiller regarding expansion of the Collin County Regional Airport. The letter stated that the City is currently in the process of building a new runway and tower, which is being funded 100% through FAA apportionments and contributions from the City of McKinney and the McKinney Economic Development Corporation. No County funds have been requested for the airport expansion. Mayor Loughmiller requested that the \$300,000 the County receives in Ad valorem tax revenue from property located at the Collin County Regional Airport be re-invested back into the City's economic development efforts.

Mayor Loughmiller specifically requested approval from the Court for the County's ongoing participation in the funding of design, engineering and construction of Phase 1 of the State Road 546 Project.

After the letter from Mayor Loughmiller was read, Judge Self gave comments saying he asked for this issue to be brought to the Court for their comments and any action regarding the project. Commissioner Shaheen said the airport is very important to the County and our region and asked for additional information on the project including a timeline for completion. Mr. Ragan said the City has route determination, but not a full engineering design because it does not have the funds to start the project. Mr. Ragan said the intent of the City was to have the road run completely around the airport and connect back to Highway 380. Without doing this, there is no access to the west and east sides of the airport. The east side of the airport is the future, but unless they get the road built, they are basically land locked. There is currently no timeline for Phase 2 because funding has not yet been identified.

Judge Self asked Bill Bilyeu to approach with information on the tiers of the tax abatement since that is what the airport entails. Bill Bilyeu, Administrative Director, responded saying the jets themselves are considered business/personal and personal property cannot be included in the TIRZ (Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone) or the TIF (Tax Increment Financing). The buildings/hangers and improvements could be taxed and the funds rebated back into the TIRZ. Abatements go back to the owner, so if the County abated back to a corporation, they would have to get the corporation to put the money back into the City or the project. Commissioner Jaynes asked Mr. Ragan for a PDF file on the project for a visual on the plan and asked how much the City had investigated a TIF. Mr. Ragan replied the City is in the process of looking into a TIF and will be in receipt of a claiming grant in mid March and it is the City's intent to have a TIF at the minimal for the airport and possibly another one for the Highway 5 Corridor. The City will more than likely implement a TIF district with an overlay by the end of the year. (Time: 09:45 a.m.)

7. <u>AI-31528</u> Update regarding the Environmental Enforcement Program by the Public Works Director and the Deputy, County Judge.

Jon Kleinheksel, Public Works, approached to give the Court an update on the Environmental Enforcement Program. Major Chuck Ruckle, Sheriff's Office, also approached with additional information. Mr. Kleinheksel presented a power point presentation which outlined a new strategy to confront and prevent illegal dumping in Collin County. Deputy Lee Howe was chosen to spearhead the County's new effort. Deputy Howe will be provided with the latest equipment and gear to combat this growing problem.

One of the tools being researched is an infrared motion activated camera that can be used to catch the offenders in the act. This would be purchased with grant funds. Deputy Howe and Public Works staff will attend extensive training and use that training for community education. McLennon County Environmental Crimes Investigator James Peck will host a summit to share his knowledge, information and prevention ideas with the staff of the Sheriff's Office and Public Works.

Mr. Kleinheksel stated Public Works has implemented an incident report form that all staff of Public Works carries with them in their vehicles. When an area of illegal dumping is seen a report is completed and submitted to Deputy Howe for investigation.

Mr. Kleinheksel continued by saying one of the largest components of the strategy is community education which includes public service announcements on radio and TV, billboards, pamphlets and crime prevention presentations. Major Ruckle is meeting with the Justice of the Peace Judges and Law Enforcement Officials to promote awareness and cooperation in addressing the issue.

Mr. Kleinheksel also showed a slide of statistics which included the number of cases initiated, cases filed with the District Attorney and Justice of the Peace Court, sites referred for clean up and the amount of debris cleaned. Commissioner Jaynes asked how many convictions have been received. Major Ruckle said to date none, but this new program has just started. Deputy Howe has only been on this initiative for three months. Major Ruckle continued saying the first case that went before the Justice of the Peace was dismissed. Commissioner Hoagland asked for the bases of the dismissal. Major Ruckle said they could not prove the person arrested was actually the perpetrator. Commissioner Jaynes commented that there were a couple of big cases that were being prosecuted. Mr. Kleinheksel confirmed this and said the County is making progress, but there is still a lot of work to be done.

Commissioner Jaynes asked if the Court could see a quarterly report. Mr. Kleinheksel replied he is actually working on a weekly report for the Court. Mr. Kleinheksel said there is not a conviction category yet, but as that information is available the category will be added. Major Ruckle added that the penalties for these crimes are too light, usually a very small fine; therefore, there really isn't a deterrent in stopping people from dumping illegally. The County is trying to have the fines increased up to the highest allowed by law if possible, which is \$500. Discussion with the Court regarding setting a scale for fines with varying degrees of offenses. Major Ruckle said one of the most important tools in this fight is education.

Commissioner Hoagland asked for the JP Court in which these cases are heard and which county the offenders are from to be added to the weekly report to the Court.

Commissioner Shaheen asked Mr. Bilyeu if the Court could set fees or fines for these offenses. Bill Bilyeu, Administrative Director, responded saying it is all by State statute. It is a misdemeanor and the JP Judges determine across the board what the fines should be. Judge Self thanked both Mr. Kleinheksel and Major Ruckle for their effort in addressing this very big issue. Judge Self then suggested the County take something to legislators in the upcoming legislative session, such as an enforcement bill that would give the County greater enforcement powers to try to deter the illegal dumping. (Time: 10:06 a.m.)

8. Al-31508 Emergency building closures, Commissioner, Precinct 4.

Commissioner Ward stated she wants a method of closing during inclement weather and said she has someone checking with other counties to see how they manage emergency closures. One of the concerns Commissioner Ward referenced was the burden an emergency closure can place on a parent when a school is closed but not the parent's workplace. Commissioner Ward said she will present a proposal for emergency closures of County buildings to the Court when more information has been gathered. (Time: 10:53 a.m.)

9. Al-31491 FY2010 Budget for the Farm Museum, Commissioner, Precinct 4.

Judy Florence, Myers Park, addressed the Court regarding contingency funds for the Farm Museum. Two gentlemen who volunteer are using their own funds to make repairs and buy parts to keep the equipment running. Commissioner Ward asked Ms. Florence to tell the Court how many hours the volunteers had worked and what the savings was to the County. Ms. Florence replied saying the volunteers had worked 740 hours each, which equates to \$28,952 that the County saved in salaries. Ms. Florence requested \$400 per month for the remainder of FY 2010 to pay for repairs and replacement parts for the museum's tractors, thrashers and other antiquated equipment. The total amount requested is \$3,200. An additional request for \$7,500 was made by Ms. Florence to pay for several items which are owned by the North Texas History Center and currently housed at the Farm Museum. These items include museum storage cabinets, a shop vacuum, filing cabinets, storage lockers and other various items. The original asking price was \$26,582; however, when the County offered \$7,500 for the items, the History Center accepted. Commissioner Shaheen asked for a strategy plan before a decision was made on the funds. Commissioner Ward stated that an overview presentation should be ready to present to the Court on March 22, 2010; however, there are more urgent needs that should be taken care of without delay. Commissioner Shaheen asked if the Court could see the presentation first, then make a decision.

Ms. Florence replied saying the North Texas History Center probably would not wait; they would go ahead and auction the items.

Claude Frazier, North Texas History Center Board, approached to say they have been working on a plan and would present it when they had something solid. Mr. Frazier continued saying what they needed to do today was to get funding for the repairs of the equipment.

The volunteers have been using their own money for two years and the County is in danger of losing them because they have to keep taking money out of their own pockets.

Mr. Frazier continued saying as for the equipment being offered for sale by the History Center, if the County does not move now, the items will immediately be auctioned and will be lost. Judge Self said the thought the Court should approve the request. Commissioner Hoagland agreed and made a motion to approve the budget.

Judge Self added that he looked forward to seeing the entire presentation because it is vital to have a plan in place in order to move ahead with the plans for Myers Park. (Time: 11:02 a.m.)
