President Self called to order the meeting of the <u>Collin County Health Care</u> Foundation at 2:46 p.m. and adjourned the meeting at 3:04 p.m.

Judge Self reconvened the meeting of the Collin County Commissioners' Court at 3:04 p.m. and adjourned at 4:25 p.m.

# **Employee Insurance presentations and selection:**

1. <u>At-34529</u> Medical, FSA and COBRA portion of the Insurance: Medical, Dental FSA and COBRA (RFP No. 09308-11), Human Resources.

Cynthia Jacobson, Human Resources, prefaced the presentations with an introduction of three candidates for county employee's insurance benefits. Each presenter was allowed 45 minutes to give their presentation and answer any questions.

The first presenter was Jeff McPeters, Group and Pension Administrators (GPA). Mr. McPeters gave an overview of his company and the services they provide. They have been in business for 45 years and are family owned. A slide containing a list of entities to which services are provided was shown to the court. Today's topic of discussion is Cost Plus pricing. Mr. McPeters said one of the main reasons the cost of managed care is increasing is due to the relationships between hospitals and Preferred Provider Organizations (PPO). There is a false perception that hospitals are either not making a profit or they are just breaking even. A slide of the average mark-up of major hospitals in Texas was shown next. To show the Court what kind of mark-ups a hospital typically has, an example of an actual bill from a local provider was shown. Mr. McPeters informed the Court of a multi-billion dollar industry called Revenue Enhancement Consulting which is a service that teaches hospitals how to charge for services so they make as much money as possible.

Another example showed a bill of \$548,000; after conducting an audit, GPA found more than \$200,000 in services that were never preformed. They received a letter that demanded they pay the claim as submitted due to a "No Audit" clause in the contract or the PPO would be terminated. This is why GPA thinks PPOs do not work. They recommended the Court eliminate the PPO or modify the plan language to say they will only pay Medicare rates plus 20% on claims. The doctor plan will not change; they would have direct contracts with physicians. Prescription coverage would also stay the same. 80% of the employee population just see their doctor then go the pharmacy to pick up their medications. The county's cost is driven by 20% of the population who are using provider facilities.

GPA practices balanced billing; under their program there is not a contract. Employees can use any provider they choose and GPA will balance the bill according to services provided. The City of Sherman has been a client for four years and has not seen a rate increase in those four years. GPA now has more than 80 employers who use the cost plus plan. GPA will audit claims and dispute charges that are over Medicare rates plus 20%. If a provider demands payment anyway, ELAP Services are utilized and an attorney is consulted. ELAP is a service provider that represents the employer in benefit disputes.

Commissioner Webb questioned the ELAP fees which are upwards of 35% of the whole plan costs. He expressed concerns that there could be a situation where the ELAP fees could be greater than the savings. Steve Kelly, GPA, approached to say that the ELAP fees would never exceed the savings. Discussion regarding fees and how claims are paid followed. (Time: 10:02 a.m.)

The next presenter was Dennis Ellis with United Healthcare (UHC). Mr. Ellis is responsible for the relationship between UHC and Collin County. They have partnered together for the last ten years. It is important to get information to employees in order for them to make better decisions for better health. Otherwise, health care costs will never go down. Following a presentation to Collin County employees earlier in the year, Mr. Ellis noted Collin County employees are engaged in the health care system, they are aware of their health concerns, and they are hungry for information to better help them navigate the health care system. As a result, Mr. Ellis prepared a strategy for Collin County for the next five years.

Kurt Hirsch, Vice President of Account Management, came forward next to discuss UHC's plans for the next five years. Diabetes is a concern for Collin County and the entire nation. There are fears that diabetes and the conditions associated with diabetes could bankrupt the U.S. health care system. UHC has an innovative program to deal with diabetes called Diabetes Prevention and Control Alliance (DPCA). DPCA partners with the YMCA and with pharmacies such as Walgreens, Albertsons, Kroger and Rite Aid. UHC reaches out to individuals who are diabetic and directs them to pharmacists who can educate them through private consultations and help them manage their condition and their prescriptions.

Mr. Ellis returned to continue the presentation and to discuss the United Health Care Premium program. The Premium program has been in place since 2005 and is the longest running program of physician quality and cost designation. Collin County is way ahead of others in prescreening for diseases such as breast, colon, cervical and prostate cancers. 51% of specialty dollars spent is funneled through premium designated physicians. The savings between a United Healthcare premium designated physician and a non-designated physician is 14%. Another tool offered by United Healthcare is the treatment cost estimator. An employee can compare the costs of treatments and certain tests on the UHC website. Employees were shocked at the difference in costs for tests such as an MRI which can be as much as \$800 cheaper at a free standing facility versus a hospital. When this tool was presented to employees, utilization doubled. This feature incorporates different treatment options with detailed information so the employee can be better health care consumers.

Mike Lynn, Dedicated Account Manager for Collin County, approached with information on the Health and Wellness tab on myuhc.com. 99% of Collin County's employees are registered on the myuhc website. UHC has 10 years' worth of claims data for employees to educate them on their health care. In addition, there is a health assessment that rates the employee and tells them where they compare with others nationally.

Mr. Ellis re-approached to finish the presentation as to why the County should choose UHC as their provider. When a survey was sent to 400 employees of the county, 91% of the respondents had positive comments. Mobile applications are available as well as Optumize Me. The most impactful thing UHC does for the employees of Collin County is customer service. They have just finished transitioning from customer service representatives to health advisors. In conclusion, Mr. Ellis stated UHC has excellent employee engagement, industry leading innovations and public sector experience. (Time: 10:59 a.m.)

The final presentation was from Cigna. Jason Motter, Vice President, came forward and explained the Cigna Advantage: dedicated to improving health and productivity, lowering costs for government employers through innovative approaches, and exceptional customer service. His discussion included varying costs of certain treatments such as MRI's. In Collin County 1.5% of the population is driving 38% of the claims. Collin County's population demographics are consistent with comparable public sector entities; however, 52% of the population is chronically ill. Cigna's Trend Management System can identify with 83% certainty who will be your next catastrophic claim. Once identified, the individual has to be engaged. Cigna employs onsite health advocates to educate the employee and coordinate health care. Interactions with a health advocate resulted in ER costs going down 18% and the cost per visit going down 9%. There's a higher engagement with disease management, an improvement to non-catastrophic cases and an increase in preventive screenings. In conclusion, Mr. Motter discussed the impact on cost and quality with physician collaboration.

Dan Borman came forward to discuss Cigna dental. There is a link between good oral health, and overall health, and Cigna was one of the first companies to realize that. Certain conditions affect medical costs. Diabetics who treated periodontal infections had a significantly better chance of controlling blood sugar.

Laura Loper, Senior Account Manager, spoke about Cigna's customer service experience. Cigna's mission is to help the people they serve to improve their health, well-being and security. In 2009 they became a 24-hours a day, seven days a week operation to be available when their customers are available. To date, over 2.5 million calls have been taken after regular business hours. Human Resources needs accessibility to someone in the call center for escalated customer issues; therefore, a Dedicated Client Service Partner will be available to them. (Time: 11:42 a.m.)

Bill Bilyeu, County Administrator, stated all three vendors would be available for additional questions. Judge Self had questions for Human Resources concerning the choice of prescription and dental plans. Cynthia Jacobson re-approached in response; HR's recommendation is to go with the prescription and dental plans that go with the medical provider.

An extensive discussion including questions for the candidates followed.

Commissioner Shaheen made a motion to select Cigna and for the Court to open dialogue with providers. (Time: 12:38 p.m.)

Jon Kleinheksel, Pubic Works, came forward with a presentation on the 50 Mile Asphalt Program and Joint Jurisdiction Issues. This issue had been brought before the Court on a previous agenda and Mr. Kleinheksel was now presenting additional options for consideration by the Court. There are currently 79 pending projects totaling approximately 90 miles of mutual boundary. These projects so far have been unable to be funded by the cities that share the boundary.

Mr. Kleinheksel presented several options for the Court to consider. In Option One the County absorbs the cost of improvements to upgrade only those road segments with County jurisdiction.

In Option Two, the County absorbs all improvement expenses and request bordering municipalities to pay all future maintenance costs. Option three, Public Works meets with each respective city to propose an annual pay back plan. Option Four, Public Works paves the road and deducts the cost from the city's bond funds. Mr. Kleinheksel does not think this option is viable. Judge Self asked how many of the cities did not have any bond money; Mr. Kleinheksel replied that while he does not have the exact figure, most of the smaller cities do not have bond money available. Judge Self clarified that bond project money cannot be used for non-bond projects.

Mr. Kleinheksel continued presenting the options. Option Five, Public Works paves the road and the city pledges to pay their maintenance funds for that road to the County. Option Six, Public Works commits two percent of their budget annually to pave the roads. Option Seven, Public Works paves the least expensive projects with the current road project fund (for example, there are 23 projects that would cost less than \$20,000 each). Option Eight, Public Works paves both the County and shared boundary segments, but not any segments that are 100% owned by a city. The total cost for the County to absorb these costs would be \$1.3 million. An extensive discussion on the options followed.

Commissioner Jaynes suggested that the Court find a different approach for collecting the money it would cost for the County to asphalt these roads such as raising the fees for animal control, dispatch and prisoner services.

All of the Court members expressed flexibility in finding a way to recoup the costs of the paving as long as a solution was reached. Commissioner Jaynes recommended the County move forward with paving all of the rock roads and then going back to the cities for reimbursement, whether it was a reduction in their bond funds or an increase in fees for County provided services.

Commissioner Shaheen expressed concerns with paying for projects the city should be paying for and setting a precedent; he preferred an agreement in writing that the city would pay back the County for the improvements. Additional, extensive discussion followed.

Judge Self opened the discussion to public comments. Frank Walker, Jr., Anna, came forward with his comments on CR 290 in Anna. Mr. Walker is open to the mutual boundary improvements. Mr. Walker and a neighbor offered to pay for half of the cost of paving the rock road out of their own pockets, but the city has not responded. The roads are maintained well by the County, but the cities have done nothing in maintenance.

He has reported multiple times about brush growing up around the corners and causing problems in driving; he and his wife had a major car accident on this road and he feels that if it had been improved, the accident could have been avoided. It was not until he used the words "legal ramifications" that someone finally came out to address the brush that is growing up around the corners of the road. On CR 372 there is culvert that always washes out, they ask the city to come out and they never do; the road starts to erode away and crack and it is always the County coming to the rescue. Mr. Walker informed the Court that with putting on paper his willingness to pay for half the cost of paving the road (CR 290) and getting no response, it is his opinion that the city will never agree to anything in writing.

Discussion regarding the need to improve and maintain mutual boundary roads continued. Mr. Kleinheksel explained that Mr. Walker's issue is a unique one; his road has a mutual boundary with Anna and Van Alstyne. The County came to an agreement with Anna, but not with Van Alstyne. There is approximately \$17,000 that is keeping them from completing five miles of projects.

Commissioner Williams suggested completing the 23 projects that are under \$20,000 then going back to the cities and telling them they are now being given options; they can pick one or the County will do it for them.
