GENERAL DISCUSSION

5. Al-43382 Law Enforcement Compensation Presentation, Human Resources.

Cynthia Jacobson, Human Resources, came forward with a PowerPoint presentation showing the annual review of Collin County's Law Enforcement compensation and relative market competitiveness. This involves analysis of pay ranges, turnover and supplemental pay. These areas were compared against Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Fort Bend, Montgomery, Tarrant, Travis and Williamson Counties, and the Cities of Allen, Carrollton, Dallas, Frisco, Garland, McKinney, Murphy, Plano, Richardson, Wylie and the Town of Prosper. Several of these entities were added to the comparison set this year per consultant recommendation.

The benchmark positions for Law Enforcement include: Detention Officer, Transfer Officer, Deputy Sheriff, Criminal Investigator, Sergeant, Dispatcher, Lieutenant, Captain, Major, Deputy Chief, Deputy Constable, Deputy Fire Marshal, Felony Investigator and Court Officer. A benchmark position can be matched to multiple other organizations on at least 75% of the job duties, tends to be stable where duties don't change much over time, and allows for comparison of ranges and structure of a job family to market pay.

Law Enforcement turnover for FY2016 remains relatively stable. The most significant change was a 6.7% turnover increase for the Sheriff's Office non-Detention Officer positions. Projections for FY2017 benchmark position turnover show an increase in Detention Officer turnover and a significant decrease in Dispatcher turnover. Of the employees who terminated in FY2016, 53% responded to the exit interview requests, and 78% of the respondents either agreed or strongly agreed that compensation was adequate for their position.

With regard to supplemental pay, all entities are required to provide a minimum longevity amount for sworn law enforcement. Most cities and counties provide education and certification pay while Collin County does not. However, Collin County does provide shift differential pay which many other entities do not provide.

There are 242 authorized Detention Officer positions with 233 incumbents. The average length of service is six years. The pay range for this position is \$36,251 to \$51,012, with 57 in the top quartile of the pay range and 52 at the pay grade maximum. Collin County ranks 8 out of 17 for minimum salary and 9 out of 17 for maximum pay.

Collin County has 28 authorized Transfer Officer positions with an average length of service of just over seven years. The pay range is \$41,529 to \$55,645 with 28% in the top quartile of the pay range. One is within 2% of the pay grade maximum, and four are currently at the pay grade maximum. Collin County's minimum and maximum pay ranks four out of six of the surveyed counties.

There are 20 authorized Dispatcher positions with an average length of service of six years. The pay range for this position is \$38,806 to \$52,015 with four incumbents in the top quartile of the pay range and one at the range maximum. Collin County is ranked 3 out of 11 for minimum salary and 6 out of 11 for maximum salary.

There are 70 Deputy Sheriff positions with an average length of service of ten years. The pay range is \$54,615 to \$73,172, and 17 are at the pay range maximum. Collin County was ranked 10 out of 20 for minimum salary and 13 out of 20 for maximum salary.

Collin County has 11 authorized Criminal Investigator positions with an average length of service of 17 years. This number is being reduced through attrition. When a Criminal Investigator leaves, the position is reclassified to Deputy Sheriff. The pay range is \$58,244 to \$78,069 and eight incumbents are at the pay range maximum. Collin County was ranked 5 out of 12 for minimum salary and 6 out of 12 for maximum salary.

Ms. Jacobson continued detailing the positions for Sergeant, Lieutenant, Captain, Major, Deputy Chief, Deputy Constable, Court Officer, Felony Investigator, and Deputy Fire Marshal. There was a brief conversation regarding turnover and pay ranges compared to other entities. (Time: 2:10 p.m.)

Cynthia Jacobson, Human Resources, came forward with a PowerPoint presentation. Claims costs for FY2016 for 1,399 employees were \$22.5 million which is an increase from the previous year of 3.4%. Employees paid 14% of the claim costs. Claims for FY2017 are projected to be slightly higher. The number of insured averages 3,342, and utilization of the medical benefits is 100%.

Catastrophic cases are those that exceed \$50,000. In FY2016, 53 claims were over \$50,000, 35 claims were between \$50,000 and \$100,000, and 18 claims were over \$100,000. There was a 2% increase in the average cost of a high cost claim compared to a 16% increase for the prior year. The top large loss claims categories include: musculoskeletal, cancer, circulatory, perinatal and injury and poisoning. Musculoskeletal system diagnoses is the leading primary clinical cost driver for the second year in a row.

Pharmacy costs were just under \$5.5 million for the year which is 25% of total claims costs. The top 15 drugs cost approximately \$1.6 million and comprise 29% of the total pharmacy costs. Employees paid 9.3% of pharmacy costs. Specialty drugs in general treat only 2% or less of the population but account for 35 - 40% of all costs. They are expected to reach half of all pharmacy costs by FY2020. Employees are contributing less than 0.6% of specialty drug costs.

Collin County's deductible, out-of-pocket expenses and physician co-pays are lower than the average when compared to other counties and cities. The dental plan deductible of \$50 is consistent with our counterparts, but our plan maximum of \$1,000 is lower than the majority of our counterparts. Commissioner Williams would like the dental plan to include preventative care. Ms. Jacobson will check into that.

Ms. Jacobson reviewed the types of plans, premium history, on-site nurse, and plan demographics. The percentage of employees with salaries under \$50,000 is 56%. Some of the new benefits in FY2016 were virtual visits, pharmacy value network and the Spine and Joint Center of Excellence. No one utilized the Spine and Joint Center most likely because it required going to the Baylor Center of Excellence in downtown Dallas. One out of ten enrolled members is diabetic. The number of diabetes claims both with and without complications has decreased. FY2016 trends include medical net paid per member per month increased, catastrophic cases increased with higher severity and chronic conditions related to modifiable health risks contributed to the trend. Retiree costs increased from FY2015 to FY2016 by an average of 41%. A total of five retirees were enrolled in medical insurance as of 12/1/16. Collin County's Advantage plan meets affordability and coverage requirements of the ACA (Affordable Care Act). The County's Wellness program has the highest utilization of United Healthcare's book of business. Ms. Jacobson briefly explained the FY2016 BMI (Body Mass Index) statistics.

In order to not have an increase to the County's budget for the FY2017 medical benefits, Ms. Jacobson explained some possible changes for the Court's consideration. These include increasing out-of-pocket maximums, steer usage to the Spine and Joint Center of Excellence, introduce co-insurance into pharmacy with minimum and maximum co-payment amounts for each tier, change medical coverage levels to account for individuals covering more than one child, change medical premiums for employees who cover dependents, and change dental premiums.

There was a brief conversation regarding surcharges for smokers and BMI. Ms. Jacobson will gather information on both possible surcharges and inform the Court. (Time: 2:55 p.m.)

Judge Self said COG (Council of Governments) will accept whomever the Court would send. Both Denton and Collin Counties are growing in numbers and as a percentage of the region. It took Judge Self and Denton County Judge Mary Horn three years to change the Executive Board makeup of the RTC (Regional Transportation Council). The Judge asked Commissioners Williams and Webb, as the Court's representatives on the RTC Board, if this idea should be pursued and how it would be perceived. Commissioner Webb said the RTC Board was last revised in 2014 according to population. The new by-laws provide for this to be reviewed every four years. Currently, Dallas County controls a large chunk of the votes. If Tarrant County votes with Dallas County they would have a majority, and the RTC would be controlled by those two entities. The Judge asked for a strategy, and Commissioner Webb said he is putting together a suburban ring to bring understanding and force the issue. (Time: 3:00 p.m.)
