# Re: Request for CARES Act Funds to Purchase MDCs and Equipment for Remote Work

The Sheriff's Office asks you to approve the use of \$355,268.90 in CARES Act funds to purchase 19 MDCs and related equipment to enable 19 deputy sheriffs to work remotely and to directly support the SO's response to COVID-19.

#### **CARES Act Standards**

A county "shall use the funds" under the CARES Act, Pub. L. No. 116-136, "to cover only those costs" of the county that (1) "are necessary expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency," COVID-19; (2) "were not accounted for" in the county's most recent budget; and (3) "were incurred during the period that begins March 1, 2020, and ends on December 30, 2020."

## Summary

This project meets the CARES Act's standards. First, the pandemic makes the proposed expenditures necessary because (1) the MDCs and other equipment will enable 19 deputies and a few other administrative personnel to work remotely in compliance with DSHS and CDC guidance and (2) the MDCs and equipment will directly support the SO's pandemic-response plan. Second, the County did not account for these particular expenditures in its FY20 budget. Third, the County can incur—that is, pay for<sup>2</sup>—the MDCs and other equipment before December 30, 2020.

## (1) Enable Remote Work

The Governor recommends that persons follow, in good faith and with available resources, the minimum standard health protocols recommended by DSHS in providing services,<sup>3</sup> and public-

health authorities continue to recommend remote work where it is feasible and effective.<sup>4</sup> Remote work reduces the population density in offices and reduces the risk of spreading the disease.

The SO's request for 19 MDCs, three laptops, and five MiFis, will enable 19 senior deputy sheriffs and investigators in CIS, four administrative secretaries, two payroll techs, and two civil clerks from Records, to work remotely. In the case of the senior deputies and investigators, the key is that MDCs are more rugged than standard laptops in terms of resistance to shocks and high temperatures and can be mounted in a vehicle.

Dispatchers in the Communications Center input 9-1-1 and other calls for service into Athena. The call notes include things like names, addresses, and descriptions. Patrol deputies access—or add to—this information from their MDCs. Deputies and dispatchers also use the system to exchange email-like messages, and deputies make various inquiries and perform other tasks with their MDCs, such as confirm driver's licenses, license plates, and VINs; check for wants and warrants, criminal history, and other licenses (boats, handgun); check narrative and victim portions of police reports; and enter required incident and arrest reports and demographic data on traffic stops.<sup>5</sup> A supervisor can also use the MDC in the field to assess a situation and directly input instructions in Athena in real time from a vehicle or other location away from the office.

Also, MDCs will enable the detectives in CIS—which includes the crimes-against-children and the child-exploitation units—to perform a greater percentage of their work remotely or from their vehicles.

The bottom line is that MDCs will enable 19 deputy sheriffs to work remotely from the office, including in their vehicles. In addition to enabling more remote work, however, the MDCs will also directly support the SO's pandemic-response plan.

## (2) Directly Support the SO's Pandemic-Response Plan

The SO's pandemic-response plans center on the priorities of (1) continuing to operate the Detention Facility, especially the vulnerable areas of Book-In and Housing, (2) continuing to respond to 9-1-1 calls (a chief responsibility of Patrol), (3) continuing to respond to all new complaints of crimes while continuing to work older cases (chief responsibilities of CIS), and (4) being vigilant about pandemic-related, opportunistic property crimes (Patrol and CIS).

To sustain operations in the Detention Facility, if a significant number of detention officers fall ill, the SO would temporarily reassign Patrol or CIS deputies, who have county-jailer licenses, to the Facility.

In turn, the SO would temporarily reassign deputies from CIS or other sections, such as Warrants or Mental Health, to Patrol to respond to 9-1-1 and other calls for service and to monitor the unincorporated areas for property crime. In addition, senior officers will have to be prepared to work patrol and respond to 9-1-1 and other calls for service.

The 19 deputies, who would receive the MDCs, are currently in CIS or are senior staff and do not have MDCs. These deputies should be outfitted to enable them to work remotely and to back fill in the field for Patrol or for other staff, who may be called to temporarily work in the Detention Facility. These 19 MDCs will directly support the SO's plan by equipping them to work like a patrol deputy and freeing others with county-jailer licenses to support the Detention Facility.

## A Note on Immediacy

On Sunday, June 14, 2020, the SO received its first positive tests for COVID-19 in three employees and one inmate in Book-In in the CCDF. County Health identified 21 other officers for precautionary testing in connection with the inmate's positive test. On Tuesday, June 16, a detention officer in a training class tested positive, and County Health identified 10 others, including two senior officers (one was an instructor) for precautionary testing. In the morning of Thursday, June 18, the SO received another positive test for a security officer in the courthouse. Late in the evening on June 18, the SO received a positive test for a deputy sheriff in Operations, and County Health recommended precautionary testing for another five deputies. By mid-morning June 19, the five had tested negative.

As of June 19, the State's Dept. of Emergency Management (STAR) has scheduled testing for the County on Tuesday and Wednesday, June 23 and 24.

## Clarification on Laptops

All of these 19 deputies already have laptops. Instead of immediately exchanging their laptops for MDCs, however, the Sheriff prefers for the deputies to retain their laptops and receive an MDC and to wait until the end of the laptops' working life to see if the MDC can replace the laptops.

## List of MDCs and Equipment

The SO requests \$355,268.90 for MDCs and other equipment. The SO requests 19 MDCs (rugged Dell Latitude computers), four laptops, five MiFis, and the related software and licenses (ICS software, EA license, and Adobe Pro). A full list with costs is attached.
