**COMMISSIONERS COURT BUSINESS:** 

Public comments related to an item on the Agenda.

Kevin Rohr, Farmersville, spoke on agenda item AI-57508 regarding the Collin County Emergency

Services District (ESD) Number 1 petition. He expressed concerns over the county's claim of insufficient

funds for fire protection, noting that rising property values have increased tax revenue. Mr. Rohr proposed

a hybrid approach, with county and ESD collaboration to ease the financial load on residents. Mr. Rohr

also called for equitable resource distribution to support fire protection in unincorporated areas.

(Time: 1:36 p.m.)

Commissioner Fletcher clarified that while property values have risen, the County has consistently

lowered the tax rate, many years adopting a "no new taxes" rate. Commissioner Fletcher further

emphasized the complexity of property tax calculations and stressed the importance of accurate

information when discussing county finances. (Time 1:37 p.m.)

Joanne Graham, Melissa, spoke in support of establishing an Emergency Services District (ESD) in Collin

County to ensure fire and emergency services for unincorporated areas. She stated many cities are ceasing

service to these areas, leaving thousands of residents without critical emergency response. Ms. Graham added that emergency services are a fundamental government responsibility and urged the court to

provide interim funding for emergency protection until the ESD is operational. (Time 1:40 p.m.)

Brandon Stacks, McKinney, stated the current fire response model in unincorporated Collin County is

unsustainable, leading to high insurance premiums, long response times, inadequate coverage, and poor Insurance Services Office (ISO) ratings. He emphasized that thousands of residents will soon be affected

if no action is taken. Mr. Stacks further advocated for better fire protection for unincorporated Collin

County. (Time 1:42 p.m.)

2. General Discussion Items:

Presentation, discussion and any action regarding:

a. AI-57508 Accept a petition to create the Collin County Emergency Services District No. 1 and set

a Public Hearing, Administrative Services.

Yoon Kim, County Administrator, discussed the acceptance of a petition for forming an Emergency Services District (ESD) and setting a public hearing date. The petition, signed by 100 property owners, was verified and filed with the County Clerk. Cities in the proposed district will have 60 days to choose whether to include or exclude their extraterritorial jurisdiction (ETJ). A public hearing in July will assess the district's feasibility, and if approved, it will be on the November 2025 ballot. The district covers all unincorporated areas of Collin County, with financial impacts dependent on which ETJs are included. Judge Hill confirmed that the petition met legal requirements and will be presented to the commissioners for discussion. A public hearing will allow citizen input before the ballot decision.

Commissioner Williams raised concerns about cities opting out of their ETJs, potentially leaving residents without fire and EMS services. Mr. Kim indicated that excluded areas would no longer be covered by the ESD, and cities are not obligated to provide services. Cities must decide by the end of April, and residents can petition or opt into the ESD by June 16, 2025.

Mr. Kim additionally presented a Statement of Shared Principles for the ESD, focusing on fire and EMS services, cost efficiency, and avoiding double taxation. Commissioner Hale inquired about the tax rate and board appointments, which will be determined after boundaries are set and operational costs calculated.

Commissioner Fletcher questioned expanding current EMS agreements for broader coverage and ensuring services for unincorporated areas, including travelers. Mr. Kim stressed the need for city-county collaboration. Commissioner Fletcher further noted that public schools in excluded areas would lack fire services. Mr. Kim confirmed this, and Judge Hill urged cities to consider the consequences of their decisions.
